The Best Gifts by Marsha Forchuk Skrypuch An adult remembers the gifts from her parents, such as time, love, and breastfeeding, and then passes them along to her own child.

Breastmilk Makes My Tummy Yummy by Cecilia Moen This rhyming book describes babies and toddlers nursing in a variety of situations.

My New Baby by Rachel Fuller

A wordless board book showing a toddler and his family caring for their new baby.

I'm Made of Mama's Milk by Mary Olsen

This board book is told from the perspective of a nursing baby. Perfect for babies and toddlers.

If My Mom Were a Platypus: Mammal Babies and Their Mothers by Dia L. Michels

A great book for older children on mammals and their babies.

Look What I See! Where Can I Be? In the Neighborhood by Dia L. Michels

A busy family explores a city neighborhood together.

Happy Birth Day! by Robie H. Harris and Michael Emberley A mother tells her daughter about her birth and first day of life.

A little boy wonders if there will be room for him after his new sibling arrives.

The needs of a new baby are explained in words that toddlers can understand. Illustrates both breastfeeding and bottle-feeding.

TOYS

Breastfeeding is Special. Available from Gateway Northwest Maternal and Child Health Network, Inc., this coloring book shows a mom breastfeeding a young baby and interacting with her older child.

Dolls Without Bottles. Young children love to pretend they are parents and to nurture their own babies. While sometimes you may want to have doll bottle available, consider times or places that are bottle-free.

Nursing Nina Cat, Nana Dog and Nuna Pig. Manufactured by Manhattan Toy Company, these stuffed animals come as a set that includes a mom and three babies. Each baby animal has a magnet near its mouth that allows it to "latch" onto its mother and nurse.
